The original house, built about 1821 for Martin Hanks, consisted of the west section. In the 1830s Francis L. Hawks and Frances C.P. Blount Hill purchased the house and added the eastern part consisting of two rooms on the first floor and one above incorporating the earlier dwelling into a unified elegant residence. The house was sold to Thomas Ruffin in 1865 who named it "Little Hawfields". Ruffin died in the Northeast room of the house on January 15, 1870 and his wife Anne inherited t
